

Council sets municipal tax rates at a level sufficient to fund the operating and capital budgets. For 2025, Council made no change to the Residential, Commercial and Industrial Tax Rates and minimal change (2.000000) to the Farmland Tax Rates.

Notably, there has been a significant increase in requisition amounts for 2025 - **these amounts are not within municipal control**. Such amounts are levied and collected by the Municipality, but are ultimately remitted to non-municipal entities such as the Province of Alberta.

Shared Service Delivery

The Municipal District partners with other local governments and community stakeholders to provide services on a regional basis.



Health Services

The M.D. is a member of the Health Professional Enhancement Committee, the Fairview Medical Clinic Operating Society and provides annual funding to STARS.

Fire Protection

While the Town of Fairview is the managing partner, the Fairview Fire Department is a joint endeavour (50/50) partnership between the M.D. and the Town of Fairview.

\$583,940

Airport

Annual operational funding (50%) is received from the Town of Fairview; capital funding, on request, has been received from multiple regional municipalities.

Emergency Management

While the Town of Fairview assumes the leading role, the M.D. and Town of Fairview jointly provide emergency management services (50/50).

FCSS

Fairview FCSS is a shared partnership between the M.D., Town of Fairview and the Province of Alberta.

The M.D. contributes annual operational funding and capital funding on request to:

- Fairview Arena
- Cummings Lake Recreation Area

The Town of Fairview also contributes annual operational funding and capital funding on request to:

Library

The M.D. contributes yearly funding to the Fairview Public Library.


